

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
## MIZUMA GALLERY

Mizuma Gallery was established in Singapore's new art cluster Gillman Barracks in September 2012 by director Sueo Mizuma. The gallery was established in 1994 in Tokyo, and since its opening in Singapore aims for the promotion of Japanese artists in the region as well as the introduction of new and promising young talents from Southeast Asia to the international art scene. The gallery creates a new vector of dialogue within Asia, by exchanging art projects between East Asia and Southeast Asia.

Mizuma Gallery has featured the works of Japanese artists including Aida Makoto. Amano Yoshitaka, Tenmyouya Hisashi, Ikeda Manabu, Aiko Miyanaga, and Yamaguchi Akira; as well as works of renown East Asian artists such as Ken + Julia Yonetani, Jun Nguven-Hatsushiba, Ai Weiwei, Zhao Zhao, Shen Zhenglin, and Du Kun. The gallery also organises exhibitions featuring the creations of Indonesia's and Singapore's forerunner Dono, Nasirun, Made Wianta, Entang Wiharso, Angki Purbandono, indieguerillas, Albert Yonathan Setyawan, Agung Prabowo, Gilang Fradika, Robert Zhao Renhui, and Zen Teh. Mizuma Gallery participates yearly in Art Basel Hong Kong and The Armory Show, New York.

Mizuma Gallery is a part of Gillman Barracks (GB) is Asia's up-and-coming destination for contemporary art. It is distinguished as a vibrant centre in Asia for the creation, exhibition and discussion of contemporary art. # RESONATE OHATA SHINTARO

When first viewing the works of Ohata Shintaro, one may be fooled into thinking that there is more to it than simply a canvas and a sculpture. Recognized for his body of works that seamlessly blends sculptures and canvases to produce playful and dreamy three-dimensional paintings, Ohata employs this technique to depict life-like scenarios of the little transitory moments that pass by too quickly, subtly evoking the warmth sense of nostalgia that resonates with every viewer. His distinct style creates a sense of dynamism and movement that elevates his works by bringing out an almost lifelike and palpable quality, even though they are not painted in photo-realistic manner. On the surface of the sculpture, each little piece of traditional Japanese paper of various colours is adhered meticulously, creating a harmonious coherence that reverberates with the rest of the scenery.

These dreamlike depictions were based on actual encounters that stirred lasting psychological impressions in Ohata's mind during his observations. He chooses to tangibly preserve the impressions by exploring the depictions of the different aspects of these moments. Through his eyes, we witness the dazzling and enfolding light of sunrise and sunset, city roads on a rainy day, and the gleaming fluorescence of convenient stores and street lights at night. With his skillful use of monochromatic colours, shade and light, Ohata creates these dramatically lit scenes that results in a dynamic atmospheric effect. One would assume that an intense light source is present when in actual fact, the "light" illuminates from the painting itself.

A lone figure is often present in his works. They seem to be in a state of solitude and

are completely lost in their own world – but when looked upon, seem to evoke a sense of emotional connection to the viewer. According to the artist, simple emotions, thoughts, and moments are being quickly forgotten and lost amidst the rapid flow of everyday life.

In his painting process, Ohata is fuelled by his inner thoughts and feelings that kindles the idea of reflecting life's simple moments. Now living in his 40s, Ohata found reaffirmation in himself as an artist. Without being influenced by the looming internal and external pressures, he chose to focus on sharpening his senses and to notice moments that are otherwise taken for granted, so that he could recognise beautiful moments as beautiful. Rather than using his works merely as a platform for personal expression, Ohata wishes to bring forward those beautiful moments to the viewers through his works, and invite them to create a meaningful connection. According to Ohata, "If viewers feel something from my work, this means that viewers and I 'resonate'."

In his first solo exhibition in Singapore, Ohata showcases a recent painting Deep Breath, drawn from his interest in Singapore's Gardens by the Bay. To him, nature has been a fundamental part of this world since the beginning of time and will continue to exist in this world regardless of human's existence. As Ohata said, "Nature and contemporary architecture seem to blend seamlessly in Gardens by the Bay. It was this fusion of old and new elements that I was interested in and wanted to incorporate into this painting. As our society in this era changes rapidly, resisting it may not mean anything. However if you take a deep breath and let yourself to go with the flow, you may be able to cope with it."




